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Lantern Theater Company Continues 2024/25 Season with Philadelphia Premiere of Keith Hamilton Cobb's *AMERICAN MOOR*, Directed by Kash Goins, November 7 – December 8, 2024

PHILADELPHIA (November 1, 2024) – <u>Lantern Theater Company</u> continues its 2024/25 season with the regional premiere of <u>American Moor</u>, actor/playwright Keith Hamilton Cobb's poetic exploration of Shakespeare, race, and modern America. Led by guest director Kash Goins, <u>American Moor</u> features Thane Madsen in his Lantern debut and Phillip Brown, who returns to the Lantern stage following his Barrymore Award-winning performance in the 2022/23 season production of *The Royale*. <u>American Moor</u> runs Thursday, November 7 through Sunday, December 8, 2024, at St. Stephen's Theater in Center City Philadelphia; a complete schedule of performances and special events is included in the fact sheet below, including James Baldwin Black Theater Night on Saturday, November 30, hosted by our Associate Producers at The Brothers' Network. Hailed by <u>The Boston Globe</u> as a "deep-from-the-heart spellbinder" and "a blisteringly eloquent and penetrating meditation on the ever-urgent matter of race in America," *American Moor* is Keith Hamilton Cobb's excavation of Shakespeare's power in a contemporary American context. An actor waits, preparing, pacing, going over his lines. The director is late. But the actor has been waiting for more than this single audition slot – he has been waiting to be truly seen and heard in the fullness of his experience and identity, and waiting for that fullness to be valued in the audition and rehearsal rooms in which he has spent his career. When the younger, white director arrives, we watch as the actor wrestles with his relationship to Othello, the frustrations and indignities faced by a Black classical actor who sees himself in *all* of Shakespeare's canon, a process that he knows will not honor his lived experience, and his desire to tackle this towering, troublesome role anyway. The actor lets

the audience into his innermost thoughts while also negotiating the tension between the director's power and his own hard-earned authority – a tension that Othello himself must navigate. Shakespeare's text and modern lyricism knit together in this vital, propulsive monologue play, holding up a mirror that reflects both 400 years of theater history and the current moment.

Performed across the United States and making its Philadelphia premiere with the Lantern's production, *American Moor* has been added to the Folger Shakespeare Library's permanent collection in recognition of its insistent and penetrating perspective on Shakespeare in a modern world. Originally conceived and written in 2012 with support from the National Endowment for the Humanities, **Keith Hamilton Cobb** describes *American Moor* as "a play about race in America, but it is also a play about who gets to make art, who gets to play Shakespeare, about the qualitative decline of the American theatre, about actors and acting, and about the nature of unadulterated love." A graduate of New York University's Tisch School of the Arts, Cobb brings a rich classical performance background to the writing, having performed roles including Laertes in *Hamlet*, Tybalt in *Romeo and Juliet*, Tullus Aufidius in *Coriolanus*, and Oberon in *A Midsummer Night's Dream* on regional theater stages across the country – as well as numerous roles in television and in contemporary dramas.

"With American Moor, Keith Hamilton Cobb has created a work of profound and personal insight into the Shakespearian canon as well as a powerful statement about race in modern American society," said Lantern Artistic Director **Charles McMahon**. "In the course of auditioning for the role of Othello, a brilliant Black performer who has spent his professional life in deep dialog with the works of Shakespeare is repeatedly undercut by a well-meaning but callow and clueless white director. American Moor is a story told with caustic irony showing the many ways in which Black genius is routinely discarded in American power structures."

"I see theater as a transformative medium, where the most tangible experiences are *felt* more than *seen*," said *American Moor* director **Kash Goins**. "I so enjoy working with plays that allow opportunities to craft a world that includes the audience. What Keith has offered us here is a literal smorgasbord of artistic possibilities. I look forward to sharing the journey that we take with this work with all who will sit with us and consume."

About the Lantern Artists

Kash Goins makes his Lantern directorial debut with *American Moor*. An accomplished actor, playwright, and director, Goins previously appeared on the Lantern stage as the Father and other roles in *Fabulation*, *or The Re-Education of Undine* by Lynn Nottage. His recent directing credits include *An Army of Lovers* at Azuka Theatre and *Radio Golf* at Arden Theatre Company, where he also starred in his own play, *74 Seconds...To Judgment*. His skill as a writer, actor, and director – and his experience on both sides of the audition room table – make Goins a natural fit for *American Moor* and its incisive critiques.

Phillip Brown returns to the Lantern stage as the Actor, following his Barrymore Award-winning performance in the Lantern's 2022/23 season production of *The Royale*. Brown's Philadelphia stage credits include *Radio Golf* at Arden Theatre Company; *Beautiful Boy* at Walnut Street Theatre; *Written by Phillis, Flyin' West*, and *Camille* at Quintessence Theatre; and *Beginners* and *Good Grief* at Hedgerow Theatre Company, as well as his work on several Disney shows, including *That's So Raven*, *Cory in the House*, and *Suite Life of Zack and Cody*. He is currently the Director of Theater at the Shipley School in Bryn Mawr, PA.

Thane Madsen makes his Lantern stage debut as the Director. Madsen's recent stage credits include Proteus in *Two Gentlemen of Verona*, the title role in *Macbeth*, and Harker in *Dracula: The Bloody Truth* at Hedgerow Theatre Company, as well as roles in Off-Broadway musicals and tours of *The Wizard of Oz* and *Fancy Nancy: Splendiferous Christmas*, and multiple television shows for Investigation Discovery.

Goins has assembled a talented creative team that includes scenic designer Marie Laster (Lantern debut; credits include Arden Theatre Company, Azuka Theatre, Theatre Horizon, and TheatreSquared), costume designer Tiffany Bacon (Fabulation, or The Re-Education of Undine at the Lantern, Creative and Production Director for WURD Radio), lighting designer Tydell Williams (Crumbs from the Table of Joy, Tartuffe, and Twelfth Night at the Lantern), sound designer Adiah D. Hicks (Lantern debut; credits include Philadelphia Artists' Collective, Azuka Theatre, and Teatro Del Sol), and production dramaturgy consultant Dr. Kimmika Williams-Witherspoon (Crumbs from the Table of Joy and The Royale at the Lantern). Lantern 2024/25 Season Professional Apprentice Rasheed Booker serves as assistant director, alongside longtime Lantern Stage Manager Rebecca Smith.

Founded in 1994 and now in its 31st season, Lantern Theater Company's mission is to produce plays that investigate and illuminate what is essential in the human spirit and the spirit of the times. The Lantern serves the Greater Philadelphia region with award-winning productions and education programming, notably partnering with middle schools and high schools in the Philadelphia School District to provide in-classroom residencies in support of curricular learning. The Lantern became a national leader in streaming theater during the Covid health crisis, producing ten fully designed plays that were created and filmed in the company's resident home at St. Stephen's Theater, garnering coverage in national media including *The New York Times* and *The Wall Street Journal*, and reaching more than 30,000 people in 15 countries and all 50 states.

Following *American Moor*, the Lantern's 2024/25 season will continue with William Shakespeare's classic romantic comedy *Much Ado About Nothing*, directed by Lantern Artistic Director **Charles McMahon** (**Press Opening: Wednesday, February 19, 2025, at 7 p.m.**); and *The 39 Steps*, **Patrick Barlow**'s rollicking adaptation of the classic **John Buchan** adventure novel and **Alfred Hitchcock** film, also directed by **McMahon** (**Press Opening: Wednesday, May 21, 2025, at 7 p.m.**).
